Item in a university archive

For items retrieved from a university archive, add its name, the name of the collection, the folder, the box, the item number and page (if there is more than one).

Item in a commercial database

For items retrieved from a commercial database, add the name of the database and an accession number following the facts of publication. In this example, the dissertation cited above is shown as it would be cited if it were retrieved from ProQuest's database for dissertations and theses.

Article in a newspaper or popular magazine

Be sure to include a page number! If you consulted the article online, include a URL; include an access date only if your publisher or discipline requires one. If no author is identified, begin the citation with the article title.

Because such content is subject to change, include an access date or, if available, a date that the site was last modified.
